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ACP Says Barriers to Participating in the Electoral Process Must be Removed

PHILADELPHIA Dec. 25, 2023 – Voting in U.S. elections and health are directly connected and ensuring equitable access to the electoral process would advance health equity, says the American College of Physicians (ACP) in a new policy brief published today in the Annals of Internal Medicine. "Ensuring Equitable Access to Participation in the Electoral Process: A Policy Brief from the American College of Physicians" A makes recommendations about what needs to be done to inform physicians, medical students, and other health care professionals on the links between electoral processes and health, encourage civic participation, and offers policy recommendations to support safe and equitable access to electoral participation to advance health equity for both patients and health care professionals.

Overview: Community Civic Engagement Program (CCEP)

Vot-ER's Community Civic Engagement Program (CCEP) expands non-partisan civic engagement through voter registration and turnout initiatives in community health centers.

Our grants of \$5,000-\$10,000 support the following:

- Staff and technology costs
- Free non-partisan materials including Spanish language materials
- Training and support from Vot-ER staff
- Access to our CCEP learning community, where we celebrate and share best practices, strategies and ways to overcome challenges.

2024 Core Program Elements

- Completing a work plan to the best of their abilities.
- Participating in the monthly program learning community webinar sessions
- Participating in a very short verbal mid-grant reflection and a short written final report.
- Sharing non-identifying data relating to your projects quantitative successes.





Who Should Apply?

- Community Health Centers (CHCs), Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), and various health center look-alikes
- Health centers including those that are experts running voter registration drives or Get Out the Vote efforts as well as those who have never done this work.
- Centers predominantly serving Black, brown, American Indian/Alaska Native, LGBTQIA+, and other communities that have been historically disenfranchised.
- Centers serving rural populations, and/or young people.



What makes a strong applicant?

This is a competitive grant and unfortunately, not all health centers that apply will be selected to receive funding.

- Having an interest in sending your patient community non-partisan voting-related reminders via text messaging, either using your own text messaging platform or one provided by this grant.
- Ability to text their patients through a HIPAA compliant list.
- Having buy-in from your organization's leadership to engage in this work. This is a short grant cycle of only 8 months and the bulk of the time should be spent engaging patients in non-partisan voting actions rather than advocating to do this work internally.
- Holding deep enthusiasm for building out the connections between voting and health amongst your patient communities.

Even if you are not selected as a grantee, we are committed to making sure all interested partners have access to free Vot-ER non-partisan civic engagement tools that you can use at your health center.

CCEP Application: Leadership Buy-in

We ask this because participation in this initiative requires organizational commitment. Since the grant cycle is only six and a half months long, we are eager for grantees to be able to 'hit the ground running' rather than spend the initial months of the grant seeking organizational approval.

In order to fully take advantage and maximize your efforts, leadership buy-in is highly recommended and ensures that you have a more competitive application.

By having leadership buy-in, it not only makes the implementation of your work easier, but it also increases staff morale seeing their leadership join them in this work!

CCEP Application: Texting Efforts

- Vot-ER has found that **text messaging outreach** to patients is an incredibly effective way to increase the numbers of people registering to vote and turning out to vote in elections. Applicants committed to engaging in text messaging efforts are more competitive in this year's grant-making cycle.
- However, we recognize that not all community health centers have the ability to send text **messages** to their patient populations due to the nature of your center, funding constraints, etc.
- We have a smaller pool of funding available to ensure that those who cannot engage in text messaging can still be part of this initiative. Your application provides you an opportunity to explain what other high impact actions you would propose doing.

Applicants who can engage in texting their patient populations and communities will be given priority funding as Vot-ER has learned that text messaging is the most impactful way for health centers to build their civic engagement work as trusted messengers. A smaller pool of funding is available to those applicants who are unable to text their patient population and communities.
